ABOVE A PAIR OF DOORS WITH CENTRAL PANEL EACH CARVED WITH LOZENGE DECORATION, ORIGINAL HINGES. THE LOWER SECTION WITH CENTRAL DOOR AGAIN WITH ORIGINAL HINGES.

Lakeland press capboards display a wide variation of door arrangements in the lower stage (the six shown here each have different parterns), but otherwise they down a fairly consistent character, a part from heavily modified framing-members, the decoration is assually coeffinide to the upper panels and rails. Shandard muss of avain gain paper diper site testen, and the intervision of datase and unitab. These are not always matrixes initiab, but may regressen only the head of the hunorheld. No double the press capboard held a place of symbolic importance in Lakeland life which is paralleled later by the deress in Wales, but his spect is not nearly so well chronicled, nor so well remembered by the people.
